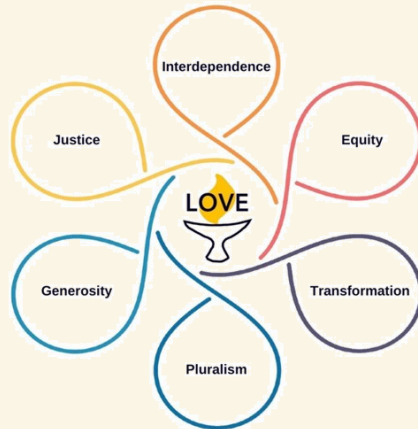

## Article II Study Commission

Although one mustn't profess any particular creed to be a Unitarian Universalist, today, the foundational elements of the denomina-

tion, its purposes and professions, are found in Article II of the UUA Bylaws. For an aspiring congregation to be accepted into, make covenant with, the Association, they must agree to honor Article II.



Article II consists of the following:

- SECTION C-2.1. PRINCIPLES - Seven Principles & Six Sources
- SECTION C-2.2. PURPOSES - The UUA serves congregations; implement principles
- SECTION C-2.3. INCLUSION - Welcome all by changing structures of oppression
- SECTION C-2.4. FREEDOM OF BELIEF - No Unitarian Universalist creed

Outside of the Principles and Sources, which many are familiar with, the rest of Article II consists of less than 200 words.

The UUA Bylaws also state that "If no study process of Article II has occurred for a period of fifteen years, the Board of Trustees shall appoint a commission to study Article II for not more than two years and to recommend appropriate

revisions, if any, thereto to the Board of Trustees for inclusion on the agenda of the next regular General Assembly (UUA Bylaws, Article XV, Section C-15.1)."

Although there have been some minor adjustments to Article II over the years, it has essentially been unchanged since 1987.

In the Fall of 2020, an Article II Study Commission was appointed by the UUA Board of Trustees to review Article II. The Commission has now completed its work and has issued a report detailing recommendations. These recommendations, changes to Article II, (and I will say that they are wholesale changes to Article II,) will then be placed on the agenda for voting approval at UUA General Assembly June 2023. Amendments and modifications can (and likely will) be made and voted on at GA 2023. To fully modify Article II, a subsequent vote at GA 2024 will also need to take place.

I urge you all to read the report and become familiar with it (e.g. the history, the process, the recommendations, etc.). I'm sure you will all have your own opinions about the recommendations. I have my own, yet my personal opinions aside, I was struck by the spirit of humility and grace in which the report was written and the profound sense of responsibility and respect that the Commission has for Unitarian Universalism and for all of us Unitarian Universalists.

I will be talking about the details of the changes in some upcoming worship services this spring.

Nurture our spirit. Strive for Justice. Transform the world.

From the RE Team, to RE and OWL instructors, nursery volunteers, play group parents and so much more. Our volunteers come from all ages and walks of life. Some are parents or grandparents and want to give back to the community. Others enjoy spending time with the youth because it feeds their souls and reminds them what it is like to look at life from a place of wonder.

If you're interested in getting involved, let someone know. There are many opportunities and any one of our amazing volunteers would be happy to talk to you about how your interests can be plugged in. Whether it be working on curriculum with the youth a few Sundays a month, helping to organize events like the Career fair, or helping our youth lead as they start their own volunteer project.

### Here's what we did in January!

We restarted the RE curriculum with four classes the 2nd Sunday of the month. Due to volunteer shortages and low attendance as we reimagine the MCY program, collectively we decided to combine Jr and Senior youth while K-3 and 3-5 classes remained separate. So far we have had great success with this lay out!

The following Sunday, we had a great multigen activity. The youth created their own vision boards by drawing and collaging magazines with the help of two of our senior youth. The next day many of us met for lunch in Cumming before we headed over to volunteer with FurKids. A whopping 30 plus children, youth and adults came out to join us.



On Saturday the 21st, the Roswell Police Department came out to educate the congregation about active shooter. I was so pleased to see so many RE volunteers there. Our own Mike Chambers has since put together a Safety and Security Team.

Following the 2nd hour on Sunday the 22nd, Little Kid Big Projects held their first planning potluck. It was a huge success with almost 30 participants. We heard from Josie Burkhardt, the project's creator, about this exciting new project. While it is still in its planning stages, it is a volunteer group led by children and youth who want to develop leadership and organizational skills to give back to their community. They recently decided to kick off with one big project, building a UUMAN playscape! This month, we launched a playgroup for active minds and bodies to play during service, from 10-11:15 AM. This group does not replace RE, no curriculum is taught. It is a place for children and youth to connect with their peers, burn off excess energy and have fun before settling in for 2nd hour.
