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Board Retreat: Goals and Initiatives for 2017-2018

UUMAN’s Board Retreat was held on Saturday, August 12.

Board work while others may be addressed in conjunction with a Standing Committee (or Ad Hoc Advisory Committee).

At the retreat, the Board wanted to accomplish three things that will guide UUMAN’s work in the coming year:

- Volunteer Recognition
- Action Plan for World Crisis
- Bylaws Revision
- Create/Enhance Service Culture Within UUMAN
- Oversight of Program Council’s Progress Toward Overarching Goals
- Reclaim our Humanity from Racism and Oppression

Ministry Goals for the Program Council

After reflecting on the UUMAM’s Mission Statement, the Board set some general ministry goals that must be addressed by the Program Council and it’s Committees. These ministry goals are intended to be general in nature, thus allowing maximum flexibility for interpretation by each of UUMAN’s Program Council Committees. It is expected that each UUMAN Committee write its own specific goals to meet each of the Board’s ministry goals.

Develop Methods to Better Engage in Dialogue with the Congregation

The Board wishes to better engage in dialogue with the congregation in order to discuss mission, vision, ministry goals, initiatives (see above), etc. To accomplish this, the Board will be reaching out in intentional ways in order to seek alignment to and gather information from the congregation. This year’s conversations will inform any adjustments to next year’s ministry goals and initiatives.

The Board’s ministry goals call for UUMAN to be:

- A community where every member is connected and engaged
- A community whose numbers and influence are growing
- A vehicle of service to our community and the world
- Radically multigenerational in all we do.

By empowering UUMAN’s Program Council Committees to do the ministry and work of the congregation, the Board can begin taking a longer-term outlook and be flexible to make informed adjustments to mission and vision moving forward.

The Underground Theatre at UUCA will present A Night of Vonnegut, a staged reading of the works of Kurt Vonnegut, featuring short stories from his posthumously published "Armageddon In Retrospect." One of the most acclaimed American writers of the 20th Century, Vonnegut was a prisoner of war during WWII and witnessed first hand the aftermath of the Allied bombing of Dresden. In this collection of short stories, he writes of the absurdity and horror of war with a sense of moral outrage and dark humor.

The readings, directed by UUCA member Liz Bigler, will be performed by a small collection of local actors.

Doors open at 7:00 pm; performance 7:30-10pm. Suggested admission donation is \$10, but no one will be turned away. Donations go to support UUCA. There will be a raffle of merchandise from the Kurt Vonnegut Museum and Library during intermission, and proceeds will benefit the ACLU, of which Vonnegut was a passionate supporter. Being Peace – An Adult Enrichment Offering

At a time of discord and division, when ideological battle lines are being drawn and we are lining up along them to act, promote, defend, and resist, how do we find peace, either within ourselves or among those around us – those like us or those we might consider the other? Might we learn from the lives and writings of the wise – spiritual masters and other teachers – that developing self-awareness - coming to know ourselves better – and accepting ourselves – is a start, that others see the world and come at it differently than we do, and that, ultimately, peace within ourselves and among our neighbors can only flow from that understanding. The Vietnamese Buddhist monk Thich Nhat Hanh tells us that love flows from understanding – and with it compassion and a visceral knowing of our interconnectedness with all that is.

Join us the 2nd and 4th Sunday evenings of the month – beginning September 24 for an exploration of this path – in reading, discussion,

listening, presenting, and practicing. We are calling it "Being Peace". Units will include: Thich Nhat Hanh's book **Being Peace**, Buddhist nun Pema Chodron's book **The Places That Scare You**, the concept of the shadow side of ourselves – what it represents and how to claim it (as opposed to burying it), and Byron Katie's **The Work**, a way of identifying and questioning the thoughts that cause our suffering. Members of the group will share in leading/facilitation of our various units. Expertise not required.

Dining for Women (DFW) Meeting

You are invited to attend an informational meeting about Dining for Women (DFW) on Sunday, September 24 at noon in the sanctuary, led by DFW Regional co-leaders. After the meeting, if there is enough interest, we could start a chapter at UUMAN.

For me, Dining for Women all started when a lady in a grocery store parking lot commented on one of my bumper stickers. We started a conversation—I spoke about our partner church in India, and she spoke about Dining for Women. My interest was piqued with getting together socially once a month for a worthy cause, and our conversation led to my attending a dinner with a Roswell chapter of women. Meeting other women with values around helping other women in developing countries and sharing a meal has been so much fun! We get together on the third Thursday of the month for a potluck. Usually the dinner is themed around the country of the grantee. There are recipes on the DFW website and I write a tax deductible check to DFW for what I would spend on a meal dining out. I would like to share my experience with others at UUMAN to deepen my relationships by having dinner and conversation once a month!

The DFW collective-giving model is proving that small contributions, aggregated together, can make a huge difference. This is especially true in the most impoverished areas of the world, where some subsist on less than \$1.25 a day.

DFW chapters meet on a regular basis, usually monthly, and share a meal together. Members share camaraderie and learn about that month's featured grantees through videos, educational documents and presentations, and free and open discussion. Funds raised each month go to fund the featured and sustained grantees, as well as support the entire mission of DFW.

DFW doesn't just give money, they invest in futures. The organizations and projects they support educate girls, teach women a skill, help develop markets for their products, and fight the prevalent gender inequality in the world. DFW is a hand up, not a hand out.

DFW funds grass-roots projects in education, healthcare, economic and environmental sustainability, safety and security, leadership and agriculture. These projects are aimed at improving the living situations for women and their families by providing the tools they need to make changes in their lives, in their communities, and in their children's futures.
